

Appendix 2 Reward and Consequence System

Possible Rewards

Pupils are rewarded for good behaviour and work. Rewards are linked to the school rules, good attendance and punctuality and displaying positive learning behaviours. These rewards are often given as Dojo points and can be swapped for prizes. Celebration assembly- selected pupils' work and positive learning behaviours are celebrated. Other rewards include positive verbal feedback, stickers, a visit from the Muffin Fairy and certificates and other in class awards.

There are also Class Rewards for reaching the class target or Attendance target.

Possible consequences

C1 Friendly Warning: A warning can be given for low level behaviours such as shouting out, talking when not appropriate, and distracting others. State what is happening and give rule reminder

C2 Amber	Name will be moved onto Amber.
	Child will be reminded about the importance of keeping the school

C3 Amber One	Name will be moved onto Amber -tick
Tick	Lose 10 minutes playtime or lunch time.

C4 Amber Two	Name will be moved onto Amber – 2 ticks
Ticks	At this point the pupil must leave the classroom and have 5 minutes
	with an adult chatting about how they could reset their behaviour. (or
	reflecting alone if appropriate)
	They will lose 15 mins playtime or lunch time
	C4s must be recorded in the Reflection Book.
C5 Red	Name will be moved onto Red
	Given for repeated unacceptable behaviours moving through the
	consequence system
	Or for incidents such as walking out of class, refusing to follow a
	reasonable instruction, swearing, hurting another child, threatening
	behaviour, destructive and/or unsafe behaviour. The pupil will be
	issued with a lunchtime reflection (am) or a period of time in another
	classroom with work (pm).
	Their behaviour will be recorded on CPOMS.
	Progression to a C5 may result in exclusion; this will be issued for
	extreme behaviours such as physical violence against another pupil or
	adult, including threatening behaviours or actions listed in the peer-
	on-peer abuse policy. Health and safety issues such as frequent non-
	compliance, refusal to follow behaviour policy.
